MEXICO SUSTAINABILITY PROJECT RECEIVES GRANT FOR 30-MONTH FELLOWSHIP TO ENHANCE REGIONAL ECONOMIC STABILITY

The Mexico Sustainability Project (MSP), in collaboration with Audrain County, MO, and the Mexico Area Chamber of Commerce, is pleased to announce the successful acquisition of a grant for a 30-month fellowship aimed at advancing

regional economic stability. The grant, awarded under the auspices of the ERC Project, represents a significant milestone in the ongoing efforts to address poverty and bolster economic resilience in our community.

The Mexico Sustainability Project was initiated in response to identified challenges including family instability, unmet children's needs, and a lack of a dependable workforce among local employers. garnered international attention on issues of economic inequity and excessive police force. Her accolades include a Humanitarian Award from Webster University, recognition as one of the Top 50 Women Entrepreneurs by Inc Magazine, and commendation from the Small Business Administration (SBA) White House of Public Engagement.

Recognizes marketing excellence in touring consumers and laudable service through volunteer efforts.

The Walk Back in Time has trippled from its first event in 2002 which drew 4,000 visitors. The variety attracts visitors, both local and distant. Its carefully laid out timeline is multi-period and offers variety from one camp to the next as it surrounds our majestic 1857 Graceland Mansion. In 2023 the major new addition was the "Old West" that complimented the established western town of "South Fork", offering remarkable scenes of yesteryear. WBIT expanded to two performance stages and filled every time slot with period and traditional musicians, as well as historical portrayals and presentations. Beyond the historical camps, visitors find such things as the new Cultural Pioneers of America, "Artists and Artisans," sector.

Philanthropic Award • Knights of Columbus



Designed to honor the philanthropy of those citizens whose monetary contributions that improve the quality of life in Mexico and surrounding community.

Since 1985 the Knights of Columbus have distributed over \$134,000 in scholarships. The annual Tootsie Roll Drive has donated over \$17,000 to local Children's Therapy and Early Education School. They have helped in the funding of the local Veterans Home walk ways around the facility and help with cooking for the residents. The Knights have sponsored numerous community fuctions like car shows, beer fests, fireworks and fish fry's. They've sponsored a local Boy Scouts Club, local Special Olympics and Veterans Emergency Evac Center and hold an annual food and coat drive to help our local Laura Miller George Help Center.

The Audrain County Historical Society's History Camp began in the summer of 2004 with 48 campers celebrating the 200th anniversary of the Lewis and Clark expedition. 2024 will mark the 20th year of this annual summer camp accepting 64 campers that have completed the 3rd-5th grades. Each year a different era-specific theme is chosen. Previous year's themes include the Wild West, Colonial America, the Civil War, the Industrial Revolution, World War 1, World War 2, modern history, and the Missouri Bicentennial.

Campers actively learn through Cooking, Living History/Storytelling, Science, Arts & Crafts, Guest Educators/Reenactments, and Recreation. These sessions are led by an army of adult and teen volunteers that engage the campers with hands-on activities and make learning history fun!
